COME AND GET IT

A diverse harvest at Four Root Farm

With four of their 13 bucolic acres under cultivation, the four farmers of Four Root Farm are dedicated to growing their business while staying small. Sweat equity is more in evidence than farm equipment on their certified organic vegetable and cut flower homestead atop Tater Hill. They don't even own a tractor.

But make no mistake, this foursome can grow stuff—regular stuff, familiar fare like red round tomatoes; but they also revel in cultivating "fringe stuff," as touted on their website: "the weirder, the better."

In addition to raising the usual suspects, Rachel Berg, Elise Cusano, Aaron Taylor and Caitlin Taylor offer up a cornucopia of exotics, from purple kohlrabi and fairytale eggplants (white and violet striped) to tomatillos, shishito peppers, and a rainbow of gnarly tomatoes. Vegetables don't have to be dull.

When asked what the farm's cash crop was, Aaron said there isn't one: "For us, it's about variety. One method of farming is to find one vegetable, like tomatoes, and go all in on that. Our feeling is that's risky, so we have built up a business model around lots of variety so it's hard to point to one thing as our cash crop. We have lots of little specialty things in pint containers that are valuable, like our greens. At the farmers markets, we have 30 or 40 varieties at a time, things people can't find elsewhere."

In addition to vegetables, riotously colorful cut flowers account for about a quarter of the farm's income.

Repairs won't deter Gillette fun

Work is underway to replace a retaining wall just north of Gillette Castle and, barring a stoppage for bad weather, the job is expected to be completed in January.

Access to the 184-acre state park—to hiking trails, the castle grounds and terrace overlooking the Connecticut River, as well as for scheduled holiday activities—is not affected, according to Bill Coleman, a civil engineer overseeing the project for the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection.

According to the DEEP website: Gillette Castle will be hosting "Holidays with Friends" when the castle will be decorated by various Friends group volunteers and open for tours from Saturday November 30 to Sunday December 22, Saturdays and Sundays only from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. In addition, to kickoff the holiday season, there will be a special opening on Friday, November 29 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Last ticket is sold at 3 p.m. and last entry is at 3:15 p.m. Tickets are \$6 for ages 13 and older, \$2 for ages 6-12 and free for 5 and under. There is no charge to enjoy the great outdoors.

Coleman said that Mattern Construction of Baltic is doing the work based on its bid of \$729,000. A portion of the retaining wall had collapsed. "The new wall will have a concrete core and the stone from the old wall will be used as veneer," Coleman said. "The intent is to have it look as close to the existing wall as we can." He added that if there is winter weather interruption, the completion date will be moved to the spring.

The Contributions of East Haddam's Endowment Funds

East Haddam has been very fortunate to have had citizens in its past who have, through their wills, left substantial funds dedicated to helping the Town meet its needs in key areas. This has been particularly helpful when our Town has faced tough financial issues or concerns. These funds are called endowments. East Haddam has probably more endowment funds than most towns of our size, and they contribute revenue for East Haddam's operating budget each year supporting Town endeavors to include improving education and the quality of life for its residents. We are grateful to these citizen donors that continue to provide for our town in perpetuity. The Table below is a short summary of the major Endowment Funds for East Haddam:

These endowment funds cannot be spent without constraints. They are managed by administrators appointed by the Town or by the stipulations of the donor citizen's will. The principal of these funds are invested to generate income and it is that amount distributed each year with the principal remaining untouched. A typical distribution has been 4% of the average balance over the prior four years.

In summary, East Haddam is very fortunate to have such generous and forward thinking citizens in its history. Over the years these Endowment Funds have contributed millions of dollars to the Town's yearly budgets, the operation of the public facilities, and the education of our students.

Eddie's Auto Body is Business of the Month

The East Haddam Economic Development Commission has named Eddie's Auto Body as the November Business of the Month. With ingenuity and innovation, Eddie Lupinek and his wife, Carol have transformed his father's business into a lean, mean and efficient machine.

They have always looked to improve the shop's efficiency, including equipment. He had wanted to redesign his cross-flow paint booth for years, but just couldn't figure out how to accelerate the curing process. They discovered the missing link at a trade show: a medium-wave infrared drying system. "This gave us the ability to go outside the box with spray booth design," he said.

Installing the drying system into the booth allowed Eddie to create a drive-through setup, which lets cars leave the shop right from the booth. The new renovation, which merely heats the paint film without air movement, fully cures water-based color to dry in six minutes and clear coat in ten. "It gives us a real edge in that it saves us a lot of time in moving cars through the shop and decreases bay tie-up time," said Eddie. It also uses a "clean room," which takes air from the shop's ceiling and filters it three times before entering the booth. This process generates a consistent flow of warm air, not only making the work environment more efficient but safe as well. "The body men are getting fresh air and using it first," he explained. This booth redesign also presents a huge cost savings to the shop.

The redesigned booth isn't the only innovation of Eddie's. He also takes pride in his custom bumper rack that he attached to a garage door opener. With a remote control or wall-mounted unit, the bumpers are safely lifted out of harm's way up to the ceiling, theoretically adding an extra bay of space. "Whatever can get mounted on the wall, does help," said Carol.

"We're always looking for ways to make the shop cleaner and run more efficiently."

Eddie also recognizes how important it is for his employees to have a clear view of what they're working on. To fulfill this need, he affixed a waterproof spray booth light to a base with wheels to create a portable, ultra-bright lamp. It even includes a handle so users can pick it up and carry it around. "It takes up very little space, about the size of a person standing, and it has an extension cord built right into it," said Eddie. "We've been on an extreme course on finding

ways to continually make the shop run better."

That goal goes for the shop's operations, too. Every Sunday, cars are dropped off at the shop by 5 p.m. Eddie then draws up each car's location on a sketchpad and arranges them accordingly. "We're maximizing work area and putting two undamaged sides together so there's no activity between [two cars]," Eddie explained.

The next morning, the techs come in to find each car's parts laid out and ready to go. "It saves hours every week by bringing the cars in on Sunday night,"

If you visit the website for Eddie's Auto Body at www.eddiesautobody.com, one of the things you'll notice is the great amount of information related to consumer rights and car repair. As the former president of Connecticut Auto Body Association and current member of its Board of Directors, Eddie feels it is his duty to protect his customers' rights by being honest and fair with them. "We educate them on their choice of the parts to be put in their cars," said Carol. The couple has aftermarket parts in the shop to show to customers, but chooses to exclusively use OE (original equipment) parts.

"I find it to be really helpful to tell the truth and tell the customers how things really are," said Eddie. "We've found that by being very transparent and truthful, the customers appreciate that. We're busy, even when direct repair shops are slow, because of our very strong customer base."

It seems that the sky's the limit with Eddie's and Carol's business. By putting customers first and educating them about collision repair as much as possible, as well as maximizing efficiency through creative inventions, Eddie's Auto Body hopes to thrive for years to come. 


Local student excels



A diverse harvest at Four Root Farm

Continued from page EH1 available mostly offsite, in season at farmers markets in Madison (Wednesdays) and New Haven on weekends, as well as through pick up at the farm of orders placed with Healthy Planeat (https://www. healthyplaneat.com). They did the East Haddam Farm Market when it was during the week. They don't offer CSA shares. The Madison market is over for the season and one New Haven market ends at Thanksgiving and the other in mid-December.

The four partners connected in Connecticut, while working at a farm in Woodbridge, and decided to start their own operation. Aaron

and Caitlin met earlier, while attending Wesleyan University, and have a young son, Ellis. Rachel is a University of Chicago grad and studied farming at the University of Vermont. Elise went to Skidmore College. Rachel and Elise are Connecticut natives. Caitlin has a day job as an architect, as a Design Director at MASS Design Group.

The foursome purchased the Miller Farm and have just completed their fifth growing season. Things are going well, but farming is not an easy occupation.

"We go home with money at the end of the season, and it's been increasing every year except last year when we stayed even," Rachel said. "We're not making what some people might consider a living wage, but we grow a lot of our own food. We're not quite where we want to be, but we're on the trajectory that we want to be on, so there's no reason to think we won't get there."

Besides Connecticut's mercurial weather, what makes farming challenging is critters, like deer, moles, voles and mice. "We have a ginormous deer

problem now, so we're going to invest in an eightfoot deer fence around the entire property," Rachel said. Aaron added, "It is going to cost us more than \$30,000, which is really scary, but one night the deer ate four beds of lettuce, maybe three weeks worth."

Another concern is getting enough well water to irrigate the fields. When it rains it pours, of course, but then it can get dry as a bone for weeks. One possible solution under consideration for elusive well water is a cistern system to harvest rainwater.

Four Root Farm has five large metal-framed, plastic-covered greenhouses, the largest three being 30 by 96 feet. All told, they cover about a half-acre of land, helping to extend the growing season for tomatoes and other crops.

Building and maintaining them gave Aaron an idea: he could make them himself and sell them to other farmers. He has entered a partnership with Toby Fischer of Gentle Giant Farm in Middlefield called Connecticut Greenhouse Company LLC. They fabricate greenhouse kits and can also install and maintain them. To date, they have sold nearly 20 to Connecticut growers and plan to extend their market to the rest of New England next year. They sell for

around \$10,000 and up, depending on what features are included; installation is extra.

With winter looming, the partners analyze the past season and make adjustments for the next one. "We do a lot of record keeping, tracking the harvest in pounds and bunches, what is selling when and where," Aaron said. "Crunching numbers affects what we plant next season and also the timing of the planting."

The partners have found East Haddam a welcoming place to put down roots. They have successfully applied for two matching grants from the Connecticut Department of Agriculture for infrastructure improvements, and they give the town's permitting process high marks. They say their neighbors have been welcoming, too. From discussion with fellow farmers, they know that not all Connecticut towns are farm-friendly.

Five years in, the small farm is getting bigger in small increments and that's the way they like it. "We feel good about how we're doing relative to how a lot of people do in this business," Aaron said. "But we still have a ways to go. We have to get more efficient. The getting-bigger trap that some farms fall into is something we're trying to avoid."




