Village revitalization draws myriad ideas

While citizens presented a wide variety of ideas at the meeting of East Haddam Village Revitalization Committee (EHVRC) on Wednesday, September 26, there was one thing everyone agreed on — the 2.6-acre town office property overlooking the Connecticut River was East Haddam's "crown jewel."

Many who spoke also agreed that what happens on the site is crucial to the town's future.

Ideas ranged from giving the prop-

erty to the Goodspeed Opera House but keeping it on the tax rolls to accepting an existing proposal of establishing a craft brewery and brew pub there. Several of the younger people in the largely middle-age-and-above audience spoke about their desire for development that appeals to their generation.

EHVRC Chair William Gerrish said the purpose of the meeting was "to hear what town folks think," and it was clearly a success in that regard. He pointed out that the commit-

tee's monthly meetings were open to the public and that people could send written comments to admin@ easthaddam.org prior to the next meeting on October 24.

The comments that have been sent in already were not available at press time but will be included in next week's paper.

"East Haddam is one of only two towns on the lower Connecticut River — the other being Essex — with a commercial center right on the river,"

Torrential flooding batters the town

Severe rains hit East Haddam hard Tuesday night, September 25, washing away a stretch of Neptune Avenue, leaving a boat hanging off the Moodus Reservoir dam by a thread, and doing millions of dollars in damage to local roads, houses and businesses.

The storm left some residents without power, some stuck in the mud, and others with flooding homes and basements. Flooding caused multiple road closures, fire alarms, basement pumpouts, and required several rescues.

The flooding was severe enough for some drivers to become trapped in submerged vehicles, requiring rescue assistance from the East Haddam Fire Department.

"It was a very major storm, and it came down very fast. There was a tremendous amount of damage done," said First Selectman Emmett Lyman. "I want to thank both Public Works crews and the Fire Department for getting on the job as fast as we began to realize there would be trouble. They stayed with it through night and the next day, until the town was as secured as we could make it. It was a tremendous effort on their part."

According to Lyman, the storm caused an estimated \$3 million in damage to town roads and properties.

Constitutional amendment would give public a say in land sales

As a resident of the town of East Haddam, I take pride in our being home to two of Connecticut's most revered state parks, Devil's Hopyard and Gillette Castle. As a frequent visitor to the beautiful grounds of the castle, I am but one of more than 300,000 people each year to enjoy this unique state asset.

But did you know that Connecticut's General Assembly uses legislation every year known as the "Conveyance Act" to give away, trade or sell publicly owned lands, including state parks and forests, without any assurance of public input? The prospect is frightening. These lands belong to all of us, and it is essential that "we the people" always have a voice in their protection.

On November 6, we have an opportunity to right this wrong. Ballot question #2 provides for a Constitutional amendment that places fair, reasonable and common-sense restraints on the sale of valued public property by requiring a public hearing and two-thirds vote of the General Assembly before a swap, sale, or giveaway of state parks, forests, and other valuable public lands can be carried out.

This is not a partisan issue. By establishing a Constitutional amendment, Connecticut will join neighboring states of New York, Massachusetts and Maine, which have already enacted similar amendments. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity. I encourage everyone to vote "yes" on question #2 on November 6, to ensure that a deliberative and transparent process directs the future of our treasured public properties. Once gone, they're gone forever.

Ziobron responds to criticism

This past week, my opponent continued his negative campaigning with both video and a mailer targeting me directly. 

Dispose of unused pills safely at drug take-back event

On Saturday, October 27, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the East Haddam Police/ Resident Trooper and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public its 16th opportunity in 8 years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs.

Bring your pills for disposal to the East Haddam Police Department at 1 Plains Rd., Moodus (access through the rear of the municipal building next to the skate park). The service is free

and anonymous, no questions asked. The DEA cannot accept liquids or needles or sharps — only pills or patches.

Last fall Americans turned in 456 tons — 912,000 pounds — of prescription drugs at more than 5,300 sites operated by the DEA and almost 4,300 of its state and local law enforcement partners. In its 15 previous take-back events, DEA and its partners have taken in more than 9 million pounds of pills overall — more than 4,500 tons.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue.

Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health shows year after year that the majority of misused and abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including someone else's medication being stolen from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines — flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash — both pose potential safety and health hazards.



said David Johnston, a Main Street resident and one of 50 who attended the meeting. He added that he and his wife moved to town 15 years ago with the expectation that the village center would be redeveloped.

"We have an opportunity here — the town is at a pivotal point," said Bill Chilton, an architect. "This is a complex design problem to set right, and it would be best to look at it holistically, to look at it in the context of the river and the Goodspeed; we should establish a balance between analyzing the problems and getting the process wrapped up."

Jeff Miller, an urban planner, said: "The RFP [request for proposals] process is very important for generating ideas, for knowing the economic viability of bidders. Issues with vehicular and pedestrian access need to be resolved." He also brought up the controversial redevelopment of Moodus in the 1960s and the importance of vetting proposals to determine if they are economically feasible in today's market

Scott Jezek, a lawyer, recommended that the town give the property to Goodspeed with "appropriate conditions," including that it be on the tax rolls. "To think that the center of town is about anything but

the Goodspeed is a mistake, "he said.

Roni Berson, a member of the volunteer Goodspeed Guild, suggested that a gift shop and a convenience store should be included in the development, the later to provide a place in town where visiting actors and production staff could shop. She also said that the input of professionals would be important in "developing an overall plan for the best use of the property."

Aaron Trawick, who was among the smattering of younger residents in attendance, said: "I'm looking for a different vibe in the downtown area; thirty-somethings in town go to Chester or even to Hartford to hang out." She added, "We need things that will bring young people into town."

Jesse White-Fresé also expressed Chester envy and supported the brewery proposal. "I am jealous when I visit Chester; it's a great gathering place. I love this town, but I don't feel there are places for me to go in the village. I think we can make East Haddam a cultural mecca."

Brendan Mathews, a builder, said the site should have "boutique stores and restaurants, places for young people to hang out."

"We need to be thoughtful and careful about what the town does with this crown jewel," said Bill Cross. "I'd like to see a study on whether to lease or

sell the property."

Edward Blaschik, who works for the Goodspeed but said he was not speaking on his employer's behalf, spoke at the meeting and also submitted a written comment, which reads in part: "I strongly believe that East Haddam should not sell the property in the Village ... [it] is one of the greatest assets the town owns. It is the door and window to our community ... Selling this property will secure us a one-time hit of what a million dollars, then what? Our town budget is 31+ million dollars. What is a million dollars going to do for us? Short-lived return ... East Haddam has to be a partner with the developer. East Haddam has to be at the table and have some level of control over the property in perpetuity."

Andrew Lord, an environmental lawyer, urged the town "not to overthink this business opportunity or to wait too long to make a decision on developers."

Jeff Riley, an architect who is representing a group of investors interested in developing the property, said after the meeting: "Everything I heard tonight is in line with what we would expect, from the concern expressed for financial feasibility and needed infrastructure and planning, to the town's involvement. It should be a participatory process."



FROM THE BOARD OF FINANCE

The importance of a fund balance

The taxpayers' understanding of the financial status of a town government is essential to the health of that government.

Government accounting can be complicated, and therefore, hard to understand. However, if properly used, there are accounting tools that can keep financial status reports simple and clear for everyone to understand. One such tool is the fund balance.

Fund balance is the difference between assets and liabilities in a governmental fund. It is a universally used metric in external financial reports for state and local governments. The information in a fund balance enables financial statement users to recognize monies that are available to finance activities, programs or projects. Governmental funds account for the essential, usually tax-supported activities of a government for a town such as East Haddam. These funds include:

- The general fund, where a government accounts for everything not reported in another fund
- Special revenue funds, for reporting specific revenue sources that are limited to being used for a particular purpose
- Debt service funds, which account for the repayment of debt
- Capital project funds, which track the accumulation and use of resources for constructing, acquiring and rehabilitating capital assets such as buildings and roads
- Capital reserve funds, which save for future capital needs in accordance with the town's Capital Improvement Plan
- Permanent funds, where a government reports principal amounts that are restricted to being invested to produce income but cannot be spent
- Fiduciary funds, which the town holds as a trustee or agent on behalf of an outside party.
- Other funds, which benefit the town such as endowments

The monies in a fund are either required to be used for the purpose of the fund or intended by the government to be used for that purpose. The exception is the general fund that has no use designation or assignment.

In almost all situations, the governmental funds balance sheet reports cash and other financial resources such as receivables as assets and conversely, amounts owed that are expected to be paid off are liabilities. In any given fund, the fund balance is, essentially, what is left over after the fund's assets have been used to meet its liabilities.

A fund balance is required to be reported in two components — reserved and unreserved. When a fund balance is reserved, it either means that the resources are in a form that cannot be appropriated and spent, or that the resources are legally limited to being used for a particular purpose.

The portion of a fund balance that is not reserved is called unreserved fund balance. It represents monies that can be used for any purpose of the fund that they are reported in. A fund balance can also show designations and intentions of the unreserved fund balance.

In summary, a fund balance is a transparent indicator of the status of a particular fund for current and future expenditure of assets over liabilities. Fund balances are critical to the understanding of East Haddam's governmental finances.

Historical society presents program on aerospace history

The East Haddam Historical Society will be presenting a program on Wednesday, October 10, titled Connecticut Takes Flight: 100 Years of Aerospace History.

roads, including Mitchell Road, Sims Road, Parker Road and Salem Road, eroded 2 to 4 feet and will need to be filled to replace washed-out sand and gravel.

Considerable damage was done to Neptune Road, which is constructed over a filled gully with a drainage culvert that runs alongside the American Legion hall. Flood waters and debris blocked the culvert and blew out a section of the road, which then flowed downstream into a homeowner's yard, damaging their vehicles and property. It is expected to cost \$500,000 to fix the damage to the road, said Lyman.

Other culverts around the town were also eroded and must be filled in.

Damage to the roads made for hazardous driving conditions, and the town's fire department responded to several rescue calls.

During a call on Mitchell Road, the Lyme Fire Department assisted the East Haddam department, using a rope rescue team to rescue the trapped driver, wrote Fire Chief Brian J. Auld in an email. No injuries of civilians or emergency personnel were

Auld noted many of the responders used their

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personal four-wheel-drive vehicles to access the location of the victims during the calls. "I couldn't be more proud of the devoted effort the personnel of the department put forth in this high-risk situation,"

Superintendent Brian Reas closed the schools on Wednesday after consulting with the town's police department, selectmen and public works department and other departments. There was no damage to the structures of the schools, said Reas, but the roads had low visibility, and Public Works was still in the process of assessing damage to the town.

East Haddam residents observed 6 to 8 inches of rainfall. On average, Middlesex County saw about 4 to 6 inches of precipitation.

The town also saw flooding along the Connecticut River near the Goodspeed Opera House. According to Lyman, there was water damage to the opera house's library and costume area.

Route 82 by the East Haddam Swing Bridge was closed due to the storm, said Lyman.

The National Weather Service issued flash flood warnings for Middlesex, New London and Hartford counties, advising residents to remain inside and off the roads if they could help it.

September is the peak of hurricane season, according to the National Weather Service, so residents should be prepared and take practical safety steps during severe weather when necessary.

According to the Connecticut Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection, families should update or develop an emergency plan, which details a designated meeting spot in case of separation, safe places in the home to seek refuge, emergency contacts in and out-of-state, and residents should know how to turn off electricity, gas or water when necessary.

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

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Mitsubishi Outlander PHEV: Overachieving Underdog

Let's begin by digesting a bit of automotive alphabet soup. PHEV is an acronym for Plug-In Hybrid Electric Vehicle. This is the latest subset of energy-efficient alternatives that's elbowed its way in between what's now a traditional hybrid (a combination of gasoline-powered engine and electric motor) and a fully electric vehicle.

The beauty of a plugin is that it initially behaves like an all-electric. Yes, you plug it in to charge it up. And that means when you head out from home, you're

running on thrifty, electric charge for the first 20-something miles. That's great for running errands and noodling around the neighborhood.

After that, it functions like a hybrid by relying on gasoline and electric power, either in series or in parallel. So in a sense, the Outlander's the best of all worlds. You can either plug in, fill up, or do both.

A 2.0-liter, four-cylinder engine is combined with two electric motors (one for the front wheels, the other for the rears). But most significantly, all-wheel drive is also featured, so the



Outlander PHEV provides all-road and -weather capability, along with enhanced operating efficiency. It's the exclusive, mid-sized PHEV SUV on the road today in the mid-market segment. There are no direct competitors. The only other place you can find such a plug-in utility vehicle is among the upscale, and certainly pricier, European alternatives. Which by the way, is where they've already sold 100,000 of these amped-up Outlanders.

Mitsubishi, meanwhile, is a brand that's long been flying beneath the radar. Unfortunately. But most recently, Nissan took a controlling interest in the underdog, and long-overdue investments are already in play. Examples of improved dealer representation, better financing availability, increased advertising commitment, leveraged purchasing power, and improvements in product detail have all been evident already.

When it comes to the Outlander itself, obviously, it's not the most luxurious or content-rich alternative out there. But that's what I like about it. It's a bit more logical and conservative, and easier to command and control because it's not overloaded with all the bells and whistles. Yes, it includes things like buttons and knobs. So not only is it intuitive, but it also comes standard with what's now well-respected and proven Japanese quality.

Neither is the Mitsubishi the quickest or most nimble handler, either. The PHEV package adds 500+ pounds to its curb weight, and thus this Outlander tips the scales at almost 4,200 pounds. It's certainly quiet, comfortable and well isolated, however, keeping the unruly noise and harshness of the outside world at bay.

And while its styling is attractive, it's not overly so. That's because the Outlander architecture is now at least five years old, so while its design is competent, it's not cutting edge. The *Chicago Tribune* calls it "a great compromise." Which is fine by me, too. (By

the way, I'm not a fan of the big "PHEV" stickers on its flanks, which call undue attention to it. I'm sure they can be easily removed.)

Interior-wise, same story: capable and conservative, but nothing over the top. Some of the shiny plastic trim does come off as a bit chintzy. And there's a funny thing I've noticed about all Mitsubishis. Their door handles and steering wheel always seem to be just a smidge on the small side.

The Outlander itself is just the right size, though — seats five, and has more than its

fair share of carrying capacity because the third-row seat is eliminated in the PHEV version (though there's still a cupholder back there). It can tow 1,500 pounds and deliver a miles-per-gallon equivalent of 74 MPGe, for a total operating range of 310 miles.

Pricing starts at \$34,595; the GT I tested was \$40,295. The upgrade included forward collision mitigation, lane departure warning, a multi-view camera system, adaptive cruise control, led headlights, fog lights, a power glass sunroof, heated steering wheel and a 710-watt Rockford Fosgate premium audio system.

The new-for-2018, practical, plug-in Outlander features a 10-year/100,000-mile powertrain warranty. And don't forget to check on possible federal and state (and dealer) incentives that might be available, since it's an overachieving EV underdog.
