Budgets set to be sent to Finance on Saturday

A proposed East Haddam operating budget of \$34,479,731 for fiscal 2021 is set to be submitted to town's finance board this Saturday, March 7, at 9 a.m. The school portion of the total is \$21,151,374 and the town government side is \$13,328,357, representing increases respectively of 3.56 percent and 6.9 percent.

Increase in the removal costs of dead trees along roadways, from \$150,000 in the current fiscal year to \$500,000 in the proposed budget, account for 41 percent of the rise in the town budget, according to Cindy Varricchio, East Haddam Finance Director.

She added that the percentage of increase in expenses doesn't correlate to the amount taxes will go up because the figure doesn't reflect various revenue sources, including grants, a nearly two percent rise in the Grand List, and payments to the town, such as an anticipated \$15,000 the East Haddam Ambulance Service. The budget projects that the state of Connecticut will provide \$4 million to East Haddam in FY 2021.

Last year the town approved an overall (town and school) operating budget for the current year that ends on June 30, 2020 that had a 3.4 percent increase over the previous year.

The budget will be scrutinized by the East Haddam Board of Finance (BOF) at a series of public meetings, workshops, and a public hearing before

Communication from the Board of Finance

Transfer Station Information

The East Haddam Board of Finance is committed to providing transparency on all financial matters for the Town. A financial item of particular interest is the current cost to operate East Haddam's Transfer Station. In response to questions from citizens, the Board of Finance has written this article in order to help answer the questions.

There has been much discussion about the Transfer Station over the past several years in Study Committee Reports, Board of Selectmen Meetings and articles in the East Haddam News. These discussions have shown that there is much opportunity and need for improvement in the facilities and operation of the Transfer Station. The First Selectman and the Public Works Department are continuing to develop an improvement plan for the Transfer Station that would both enhance the services and provide better control on the cost of operation. In order to assist the townspeople with the understanding of the finances for the Transfer Station, the Board of Finance believes that it is very important for everyone to know the current costs and revenues for the Transfer Station (tipping fees, hauling costs, recycling payments, facilities, equipment, manpower, etc.). By knowing the sources of the current costs and revenues, we can see the challenges and appreciate the need for improvement. The Transfer Station is a complicated facility and therefore, several sets of numbers are needed to better describe the situation. We will start with the total expenditures and revenues for the

Transfer Station for the past five years and the current year as follows:

Hauling costs and tipping costs are almost 90% of the refuse removal costs. Recycling payments help reduce the total cost. However, they are a variable dependent on a shrinking recycling market. The actual variation over the past years and to-date for this fiscal year is shown below:

Summary:

- The historical record shows a steady trend where the tipping fees and hauling costs are the principal drivers for increasing total expenditures.
- The Transfer Station is experiencing an expense increase in the current fiscal year due to increasing tonnage and new contracts with higher hauling rates and tipping fees.
- Recycling is becoming all cost with no longer any revenue. As of March 1, 2020, the Town will no longer receive payment for recycling, instead the Town will be charged. We were receiving a payment from the recycling processer of \$5 per ton for recycling and we will now be paying \$30 per ton for recycling.
- The primary concern is the potential for further cost increases.
- The First Selectman along with the Public Works Department will continue to be challenged to develop and execute an improvement plan that makes the entire Transfer Station operation more efficient and less costly to the taxpayers while providing acceptable services.



being voted on by town residents in early May.

East Haddam First Selectman Rob Smith pointed out that some of the increase spending will be offset by savings: for example, a new position in public works is expected to decrease the amount the town pays outside contractors for snow removal, he said.

Contracted salary raises for town employees are estimated to increase by two percent or more, depending on current contact negotiations. Vehicle replacement costs include a police cruiser, a truck for public works and a backhoe at the Transfer Station.

Other expense hikes include paying for more town employees availing themselves of the town's fringe benefit program and increased fees for such things as 911 service and technology services for both the town and the schools. "This week instead of getting \$5 a ton for recyclables the town starts paying \$30 a ton for them," he said.

The first chance for the public to weigh in on the proposed budget is this Saturday, March 7 at 9 a.m. at the Board of Finance's first workshop. The next regularly scheduled BOF meeting is Monday March 9 at 7 p.m. Two additional public workshops are scheduled for Saturdays this month, March 14 and March 21, both at 9 a.m. All of the meetings are held in the Municipal Building.

The public hearing on the budget is set for Tuesday April 7 at the Nathan Hale-Ray High School auditorium. The annual town meeting on the budget is on Tuesday April 21 in the Old Town Hall and the referendum is Tuesday May 5 in Municipal Building.

In related news that also will impact the mill rate, which determines what property owners pay in taxes, the town's grand list increased nearly two percent

In addition to the operating budgets, the school board and the town board of selectmen submit separate requests for funding of capital projects, such as a new track for the Nathan Hale-Ray High School. If these are approved, the cost can be spread out over several budget years or paid for over a longer time period through bonding.

In an interview last week, East Haddam Board of Finance Chair William DiCristofaro said, "There are two things I have my eye on right now: one I'll call public works in general, and that includes removing dead trees. If you think of the challenges public works has faced, it was also the serious damage we had to roads from the washout a couple of years ago [from a 2018 rain storm] and the coordination with FEMA. There are a number of factors in play there that are uncharacteristic or an anomaly. We're working through all that and we making great progress and we have to keep our eye on that."

"The other thing is some of the good news that I'm starting to see," he added. "I noticed today [last week] that Gov. Lamont released some funding for roads and municipalities [Gov. Lamont released \$625 million to cities and towns that includes \$60 million for roads]. That is always a concern, what will happen with the state. Good, bad or indifferent, the state is our partner and releases money to us each year. We can look at the money we get one year and the next year it can be problematic."

DiCristofaro also said that the town has improved how it scrutinizes and prioritizes capital expenditures through the creation of a Long Range Capital Improvements Committee. "Last year we put a concerted effort into anticipating our capital expenditures," he said. "We're not only looking at them but projecting them through [the new committee], putting some of these projects on the radar and coordinating with finance on them to determine which ones we can do first. We don't have the funding to do it all at once. We're a small town. This focus on capital spending analysis is a positive change, how we're going to do them, when we're going to do them or whether we do them at all."

The new capital improvements committee is made up of the first selectman, two members of the BOF, three members of the board of education, and one member of planning and zoning commission. It will work with the BOF at its three workshops this month to develop a combined school/town capital plan.

In an interview last week, Brian Reas, Superintendent of East Haddam Public Schools, said that a 2.8 percent increase is required just to cover contracted school salaries for fiscal 2021. He cited an increase in special education tuitions and the need for a fourth third grade teacher because of a bump in enrollment for that class.

He also addressed the four top projects in the schools' proposed capital budget: upgrading the envelope around the East Haddam Elementary School, a new track for the Nathan Hale-Ray High School, additional air conditioning for the town's three schools, and irrigation for high school and middle school playing fields.

He said, "The envelope project would cost about \$1.7 million and the cost to the town would be about \$970,000 we expect, depending on the state reimbursement rate, which changes from year to year."

He said the track project, which is not reimbursable, would also cost about \$1.7 million. On the irrigation request, he said, "We have fields that drain immediately and dry out or we have fields that collect water. The track project would fix the field that sees the most collection of water."

The air conditioning project would extend the current partial coverage at the three schools. The elementary school is two-thirds air conditioned, as are school offices, the high school auditorium, and the libraries at the middle and high schools. "With warmer springs and falls, this is something we have to look at," he said.

"Those are the big things and the question is the timing," he said. "Is it possible to schedule them in a way that has the minimal impact on the town's budget. We want to keep the budget as stable as possible."



The multi-talented Ira Sakolsky

After he graduated from college, Ira spent 24 years working as an actor, including a stint on Broadway, where he understudied for the late Bruce Adler, who was nominated for a Tony Award for his starring roles in "Those Were the Days" and "Crazy For You", and had a singing role in Disney's "Aladdin" and "Aladdin and the King of Thieves". Sakolsky was also Woody Allen's and Al Pacino's stand-in on four feature films.

So how did he end up in East Haddam?

"What got me up here was an audition for the National Theater of the Deaf," he said. He was hired in the mid-1990s to both 'voice' for the deaf actors, who signed their lines, and compose and perform the music underscore for the production. "I had never written an underscore before, but I heard it in my head," he said. He toured with the theater for three years all over the U.S. and continued to write for them. While there, he and one of the sign language interpreters, Monica Gaudio, fell in love. They married and lived here until her death in 2009.

In 2003, Sakolsky earned a Grammy nomination for "The Christmas that Almost Wasn't," based on an Ogden Nash poem in collaboration with Will Rhys, the artistic director of the National Theatre of the Deaf. Actor John Lithgow narrated the musical play, which featured rock and blues, in addition to more traditional symphonic music.

"It was so, like, fate," he said of the project, which was recorded in Los Angeles, Washington, D.C., Florida and Canada. "All these recognition things were kind of happening at the same time."

About 16 years ago, Sakolsky got a call from the Valley Railroad Company, which runs the Essex Steam Train and Riverboat. The company wanted him to create a production for their North Pole Express and other special events. Rob Bradway, a town resident, is the company's vice-president for track and property and has known Sakolsky for about 15 years. "Ira is one of those people you find yourself fortunate to meet at least once in your lifetime. Creative, kind, brilliant, talented, from-the-heart. He's a person who can take vision and fantasy and

turn it into reality. He's a unique dude, and I'm lucky to find myself in his orbit," Bradway said.

He continued, "We reached out to him for help with our North Pole Express holiday trains back then, and I can't imagine Christmas on the train without him. Ira is the creative director and works with the 50 or so actors who host each train car, helping them create unique North Pole characters, come up with backstories, connecting one actor to the next. He has created the "arc" of the on-board show with the actors, the original music. His goal is to bring the 30 to 60 individuals in each train car into a sense of commu-

nity by the time they disembark and head out on their way. As the production manager, it is my pleasure to work elbow-to-elbow with Ira to bring the actors into concert with Santa and Mrs. Claus, the elves and Sleepy Servers, the train crews, the technical/stage manager. We have a lot of sleepless nights, phone calls, emails, texts, talks to keep the show on the railroad. With nearly 240 sold out departures onboard three different trains, Ira and I have our work cut out! I can't imagine a better person to do this with!"

He said Sakolsky is active in the community as well. "Around town, Ira has been a huge supporter of youth

music. He operates a studio, which in addition to the professional work done there, is a right-of-passage stop for a first recording session for aspiring local musicians. He's been Grammy-nominated for his work. He plays nearly every instrument available. He's a nucleus guy—beautiful people surround him. The guy's just brilliant, what else can I say? Yeah, I'm a fan. I'll bet it's not too well known that East Haddam has such a person within the town lines."

Casey Carle, an East Haddam resident who performs throughout the U.S. and internationally with bubbles in his "Bubblemania" productions, met Sakolsky when they and Carle's wife, Kandie, were cast members at the National Theater of the Deaf.

"I got to know Ira through Kandie's work, and eventually through our shared creative endeavors in local theater and through hiring of his specialized skills as voice-over talent and sound engineer for audio and music recordings related to my touring stage shows," he said. "It was easy to become close friends because of his patience, professionalism and authenticity. He genuinely cares for the person as much as the process. This innate ability to allow creative people to feel comfortable in his presence allows them to do their best work. And allows his friends to be themselves.

Sakolsky is working on a couple of writing projects. "The Mark", is a play about the people who frequent an old restaurant on the Lower East Side of Manhattan; he hopes it will make it to Broadway. He has also written a play with music, "Methuselah's Guide to Online Dating" with Todd Little. The play was initially produced at the Deep River Town Hall Theater and at the Third Avenue Playhouse in Wisconsin.

He taught himself the ins and outs of music production and runs the high-tech hardware and software in his studio. "I've been very blessed," he said. "I've been given a lot of gifts. My goal is to uplift people, and in order to do that you have to lift yourself. The more you do it, the more wonderful things happen."
